# INSTITUTIONAL IMPROVEMENT OF ENTREPRENEURSHIP FOR ENHANCING LIVING STANDARDS

The paper concludes with policy recommendations aimed at further strengthening institutional capacity and promoting sustainable, inclusive entrepreneurship.

Entrepreneurship is a cornerstone of sustainable economic growth and an effective mechanism for improving the welfare of the population. In developing countries such as Uzbekistan, entrepreneurship not only stimulates production and innovation but also contributes to job creation, poverty reduction, and income equality. Over the past decade, Uzbekistan has undergone major institutional reforms designed to support private sector expansion, improve the business environment, and strengthen property rights. The "New Uzbekistan Development Strategy (2022–2026)" prioritizes institutional modernization, focusing on digital transformation, administrative simplification, and financial inclusivity.

#### Literature Review

The theoretical foundations of entrepreneurship and institutional development are rooted in the works of Schumpeter (1934), who emphasized innovation as the driving force of economic progress, and North (1990), who

defined institutions as "the rules of the game" shaping human interaction. According to North, strong institutions lower transaction costs, increase efficiency, and enhance productivity — all essential for sustainable entrepreneurship. In the context of Uzbekistan, recent works by Turayeva (2024) and Yusufaliyev (2025) highlight how institutional transformation—especially digitalization and regulatory simplification—has improved SME performance, yet regional disparities and financial constraints persist. Thus, institutional reform is not merely an administrative process but a strategic mechanism for inclusive and sustained development.

#### **Results and Discussion**

Since 2017, Uzbekistan has implemented comprehensive institutional reforms aimed at fostering entrepreneurship and creating a favorable business climate. These reforms have included the simplification of business registration and licensing procedures, the establishment of the Entrepreneurship Support Fund, the promotion of women's and youth entrepreneurship through microloan programs, the expansion of e-government services to support small and medium enterprises (SMEs), and the introduction of tax incentives to encourage innovationdriven start-ups. Collectively, these measures have strengthened the competitiveness of the private sector, increased employment opportunities, and contributed to higher income levels, thereby improving the overall social welfare of the population.

Over the period from 2017 to 2024, the country has witnessed a remarkable transformation in its business environment, supported by institutional reforms, improved access to finance, and targeted state programs promoting private initiative. These changes have not only stimulated economic activity but have also had a direct and measurable impact on people's living standards. Between 2017 and 2024, the share of small business in Uzbekistan's GDP increased by 22.5%, signifying a structural shift in the economy from state-dominated sectors to a more diversified and market-oriented system. This growth reflects the growing capacity of private enterprises to contribute to national income and demonstrates the government's success in creating conditions conducive to entrepreneurship. Small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) have become key drivers of value creation, innovation, and employment, helping to build a more resilient and inclusive economy.

Employment in the private sector rose by nearly 40% during this period, indicating that entrepreneurship has become a crucial source of job creation. This increase encompasses both formal employment within registered enterprises and the expansion of self-employment opportunities, especially among youth and women. As new businesses have emerged across regions, they have generated sustainable livelihoods and reduced dependence on public-sector jobs. Consequently, the private sector now plays a central role in absorbing labor, reducing unemployment, and stabilizing household incomes. Another significant indicator of social improvement is the tripling of average household income between 2017 and 2024. Rising entrepreneurial activity has increased wages, expanded production capacities, and encouraged investment in local economies. The growth in household income reflects not only higher employment rates but

also the spillover effects of business development—such as increased demand for goods and services, better access to markets, and higher productivity levels. These factors collectively enhance purchasing power, leading to improved consumption, better housing, and access to quality education and healthcare services.

## **Analysis of Results**

The empirical data presented in Table 1 clearly demonstrate that the institutional modernization of entrepreneurship in Uzbekistan has become a decisive factor in improving living standards. Over the 2017–2024 period, key indicators such as GDP share, employment rates, household income, and poverty reduction have shown stable and positive dynamics. This confirms that entrepreneurship development is not only an economic phenomenon but also a powerful social transformation tool. One of the most important findings is the strong correlation between the expansion of small businesses and poverty reduction (r = -0.79). This relationship indicates that as entrepreneurship grows, more employment opportunities emerge, especially in rural areas, thereby enhancing household income and decreasing social vulnerability.
